Principal's Message

You may recall that we are in the first year of our three year Site Improvement Plan (SIP) with our number one goal being to increase the number of students achieving SEA (Standard of Educational Achievement) and higher bands in reading. This term, two assessments will occur, enabling us to reflect on how our improvement journey is progressing; the Phonics Screening Check and the Progressive Achievement Tests (PAT.)

Phonics Screening Check-Phonics is the relationship between letters and sounds. It is vital in learning to read. The Phonics Screening Check (PSC) is administered to Year 1 students by their classroom teacher. It is organised in 2 sections with a mixture of 40 real words and pseudo-words (made-up words). Year 1 students should be able to decode at least 28 of the 40 Phonics Screening Check words correctly.

Progressive Achievement Tests (PAT)-The Progressive Achievement Tests (PAT) are online reading comprehension and maths assessments aligned to the Australian Curriculum. The tests are administered each year and provide teachers with information about the learning strengths and needs of their students in Years 3-6



A Message from Mr Perri

Students learn about 'Flipping Your Lid' as part of our focus on understanding and managing stress in our bodies and getting ready to learn. A quick and easy way to talk about this with your child is using the Hand Model (pictured). Our Pre-Frontal Cortex (PFC) is our wise eagle, which helps us make smart decisions and think before we act. When our wise eagle is in control, we are calmand ready to learn, and our brains and bodies feel relaxed and safe. When we are stressed, our lid flips and our wise eagle flies away, leaving our Amygdala, the guard dog of the brain, in control. This can leave us feeling tight and hot, heightened and uncomfortable. This helps us in situations when we are in real danger, but sometimes when we are stressed, our brain thinks we are in danger and we flip our lid. We might 'fight' - stomp our feet, clench our fists, yell, blame others; 'fly' - run away, try to escape, hide; or 'freeze' - body feels frozen, crawl into a ball, brain stops understanding what's happening to us. The good news is we can 'close our lid' and calm down our guard dog by taking slow deep breathes, talking to someone about our feelings or using mindfulness to pay attention to what we can hear, smell or touch. Adults can flip their lid too! What works for you when you 'flip your lid'? Share your strategy with a loved one and maybe you'll help them when their guard dog starts barking!

A Message from Miss Cooke

Fluency describes the ability to read with speed, accuracy and proper expression. As readers, in order for us to comprehend what we are reading we first need to be able to decode the words in front of us, build our vocabulary to have a deep understanding of what a range of words mean and then read at a rate quick enough for our brains to join it all together and make meaning. This is the case when reading aloud or silently.

Students who sound awkward or speak in broken sentences when they are reading are not yet reading fluently, and those students may still be building their decoding skills or may need more practice with speed and smoothness when reading. Fluent readers read in response to punctuation, they add appropriate intonation and utilise expression. Building a students ability to read fluently increases their capacity to not only engage in a range of texts but can be transferred over into all subject areas leading to greater engagement and progress in their learning.


This year, our Year 2 students and their teachers have been participating in an Oral Reading Fluency Trial. The purpose of this trial is to explore an updated set of assessment measures that are specifically designed to identify strengths and areas of need for oral reading fluency. As part of the trial, our Year 2 students complete three short assessments throughout the year, our teachers engage in a number of professional development sessions relating to pedagogies for developing readers and the student data is used to target reading learning towards student needs.

After having recently completed the mid-year assessments, we look forward to seeing what the results show at the end of Term 4.

Specialist Team Talk: Junior Primary Health with Frau Shahrooei


Students in the Junior Primary classes are working through the Child Protection Curriculum in Health. These pictures are of students from Room 22 who were learning about personal space (as are Room 17.) Students had to move around the classroom with their hoops around themselves and then sit down, without bumping anyone else's hoop (ie, without moving into someone else's personal space!)

We discussed how everyone's feeling of personal space can be different, and it will be different depending on the person that someone is near as well. Students were thinking about how they can recognise personal space requirements for other people, as well as their own.


How we teach reading at Karrendi

"When we know better, we do better!"

We are deeply committed to ensuring that all of our students are successful readers and this year, you will have noticed some changes in how we teach reading at Karrendi.

"The most fundamental responsibility of schools is teaching students to read. Because reading affects all other academic achievement and is associated with social, emotional, economic, and physical health, it has been the most researched aspect of human cognition." Dr Louisa. Moats

As shared by Ms Cooke throughout the year, we are learning more about the research of how children learn to read, how to ensure that every student learns to read and what to do when a child encounters difficulty in learning to read. The research that we are learning about and implementing, is called the Science of Reading. The Science of Reading is an emerging consensus, based on thousands of studies, helping us to understand the cognitive processes that are essential for reading proficiency (how the brain learns to read.) One particular, evidence-based framework, that our team have been learning about, is called Scarborough's Reading Rope.



Scarborough's Reading Rope consists of lower and upper strands. The word-recognition strands (phonological awareness, decoding, and sight recognition of familiar words) work together as the reader becomes accurate, fluent, and increasingly automatic with repetition and practice. Concurrently, the language-comprehension strands (background knowledge, vocabulary, language structures, verbal reasoning, and literacy knowledge) reinforce one another and then weave together with the word-recognition strands to produce a skilled reader. This does not happen overnight; it requires instruction and practice over time.

Weakness in any strand of the Rope can disrupt reading. At Karrendi, we are closely monitoring our students to ensure that every strand of their Reading Rope is strong and intertwines, resulting in skilled, successful readers.

How we teach reading at Karrendi

"When we know better, we do better!"

Whilst we are monitoring student ropes for weaknesses, we are delivering quality effective literacy instruction for learners. We understand that this is absolutely critical and know that the sooner children master the basics of learning to read, the sooner they can experience the joys of reading to learn.

In order to establish strong ropes for our students, from the moment they enter our doors, this year we have invested in InitiaLit. InitiaLit is a research-based program that address reading, spelling and writing by:

- Actively teaching the relationships between sounds and letters.
- Building vocabulary and comprehension skills through quality children's books
- Giving children lots of practice in reading, handwriting, spelling and writing activities

What do our teachers think?

It has been incredible to see student's growth this year throughout the InitiaLit program. Students in our class started off the year only knowing a few sounds, and they are now reading decodable passages fluently and writing different types of sentences. I look forward to seeing what students can achieve by the end of the year!

I've used various synthetic phonics programs at different schools in the past, but InitiaLit seems to be the complete package. Every single student in my class is making progress in oral language, learning new vocabulary, learning letter names and sounds, writing words and sentences, handwriting, as well as reading decodable words and tricky words. The lessons and activities are engaging for students and I am very impressed with their growth.



The level of engagement and enthusiasm in Room 23 has been great! The pride on student faces when they can decode, read fluently, write a sentence, identify what a sentence needs to then be wanting to presevere and practice more challenging words is amazing! InitiaLit allows students to all be involved within the explicit teaching through multiple entry points, work in both small groups and independently with content that can be differentiated for all students. Having the 'I do, we do, you do' approach in all lessons encourages the solidification of the concepts being taught, which students really engage in. We have seen continuous and progressive growth in 'closing the gap' through the implementation of InitaLit. I believe it is a fantastic program to implement and commit to within the Junior Primary.






