# A Message from Ms Sam

#### **Auditory Processing Disorder**

Auditory processing disorder (APD) is a hearing disorder that disrupts how the brain processes sounds. This affects a learner's ability to know where a sound has come from, what it is, and when it happened. APD can affect language development and learning to read.

Learners with APD may have:

- poor attention and related behavioural issues
- learning challenges
- delayed phonological awareness and discrimination
- reading development delays
- difficulty with auditory memory such as following a multiple-step request or holding information in their working memory.

Learners with APD respond well to adjustments and targeted interventions. The main approaches to interventions can include:

- using listening devices and support for auditory learning
- specific literacy intervention
- interventions for understanding and learning speech and language.

## A Message from Miss Schinella

This term our teachers have taken part in professional learning on the teaching of vocabulary. Knowing many words helps children to understand and talk more precisely about their world and is also very important for reading and writing. There are lots of ways you can help boost children's vocabulary at home.

#### Boosting vocabulary throughout the day

**Listening to stories** promotes vocabulary learning as they contain interesting words children don't typically hear in everyday conversation. Books introduce new words and opportunities to talk about what the words mean.

**Daily activities** such as in the supermarket or at lunch times supports rich conversations for new word learning, e.g. 'This paper is my receipt, it shows everything I bought and how much I paid. Each time I go to the shops I get a receipt.'

**Pretend play** provides opportunities to hear and pick up new words, e.g. while playing 'doctor' introduce and explain words like patient and bandage.

#### How can I help my child learn words?

**Do:** show the meaning of the word. Say the word clearly and explain the meaning, e.g. 'Enormous means really, really big.' **Do:** show the meaning of the word. Show what the word means and give real life examples. Find pictures that show the word meaning, use facial expressions, use gesture, change the way you say the word, e.g. a tired voice for 'weary'.

Revise: revisit the word many times give the child hands on experiences using the new words. Teach it until they talk it back to you!

### A Message from Mrs Sellwood

Pictures books are a great tool for teaching social skills, emotional literacy and developing cognitive functioning. Pictures books are the perfect way to learn about how we can manage different situations, discuss different points of view and explore different emotions and social scenarios.

Below are some wonderful picture books covering topics such as courage, risk taking, and the feelings associated with this. These are popular books that can be found online or in your local library.

Some questions you can ask throughout the story include: How was the character feeling at the start, middle, end? What did they do to show courage/bravery/honesty etc? Can you describe a time when you felt the same? What challenges did the character face?



### A Spotlight on Learning - Room 16

### **Exploring the Concept of Time: A Journey with Our Youngest Learners**

This term, our class explored the foundational concept of time through engaging, hands-on activities aligned with the Australian Curriculum. By blending interactive lessons and practical exercises, students developed an understanding of both the abstract and practical aspects of time.

#### **Discovering the World of Time**

Students were introduced to time through activities that helped them grasp terms like "morning," "afternoon," and "night."

- **Daily Routines:** Students shared and illustrated their daily routines, learning how time passes throughout the day.
- **Sequencing Events:** Through sequencing cards, they arranged daily events in order, understanding the flow of time from one activity to the next.

• Songs and Games: Fun songs about the clock and days of the week, along with the game "What's the Time Mr. Wolf?", made learning both enjoyable and memorable.







#### **Building on Time Knowledge**

As students gained confidence, they advanced to understanding hours and half-hours on analog clocks.

- •Time Telling with Clocks: Students practiced reading and setting clocks, focusing on hours and half-hours.
- Classroom Table Clocks: In pairs, students created clocks using cubes and pencils, reinforcing their understanding by setting specific times requested by the teacher.
- •Estimating Time: Students estimated how long activities like star jumps or catching a ball would take, then measured the actual time with sand timers or digital clocks, recording their results for comparison.
- •Color in the Clock: Crafting their own paper clocks, students assembled and moved the hands, reinforcing their learning while enhancing motor skills and creativity.

These activities fostered a deeper understanding of time while engaging students in fun, practical, and creative learning experiences.

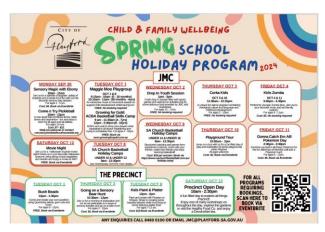


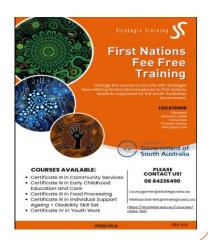

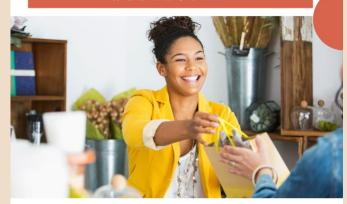
